I learned something quite interesting a number of years ago while learning to ring handbells (and have been reminded of it these past few weeks while rehearsing with the chimers). I had thought it would be quite simple: after all, if I can read music while I'm sitting in the alto section of the choir, surely it would be no problem at all to read music and figure out when to ring a couple of bells. Probably it would be even easier, I thought to myself. After all, sight-reading a voice part means following your whole melodic line, up and down, reading pitches and rhythms. Sight-reading at the keyboard is even harder (not that I do it well!) – you have to keep up with all ten of your fingers at once – and your feet as well, if you're an organist! Only having to keep up with one or two notes out of the whole mess of melody and harmony seemed like it would be simple . . . fun . . . maybe even relaxing.

WRONG! I quickly discovered that playing handbells and reading the music involves an entirely different set of skills. Of course it helps to know which notes on the staff are which . . . but you have to think about the music in a completely different way. You have to listen to it in a different way. You don't have "your own line" to follow in order to keep your place . . . you have to count, count! For someone who thinks of herself as a pretty good musician, it was a humbling experience!

There are times when our journey of faith can humble us in much the same way. In the world of our day-to-day living we acquire certain skills and knowledge, we achieve a certain level of competence, we become good at certain things. It is natural to expect that those will translate somehow into skills/knowledge/competence that will move us further along on our faith journey. And some of them do, thanks be to God! But we often find that growth in faith involves laying aside some of those things we are good at – or learning to do them in different ways – in order to fit it with the plan of God's melody and harmony. For example: in the "real world," we most often are rewarded for working hard and harder. The more we accomplish, the more valued we are. But God does not value us according to our hard work. God appreciates and celebrates the work we do – but God values us because of who we are, not what we do.

The world values "wisdom"; God calls and uses the simple, and makes them wise. The world values strength; God calls and uses the weak, and makes them strong. Makes <u>us</u> wise and strong, as soon as we stop assuming that we already have what it takes to do God's will!

Ringing handbells ended up being fun, in addition to being humbling . . . after I let go of the assumption that I already knew all I needed to know in order to do it right. Journeying with God may also be humbling . . . but it is also tremendously rewarding and yes, some days, fun. Praise God!

REMEMBERING GOD WHILE WE ARE YOUNG

ECCLESIASTES "12: 1 - 8" (V.1)

Charles, a seasoned pastor, received a call from two of his parishioners begging him to talk to their adult son. This young man was not living a raucous life by any

means, but his parents were concerned that he was living only for himself, concerned only with fame and fortune and not the things of God. When Charles met with the young man and explained the gospel, the young man replied, "Yeah, pastor, I know all of that. In a couple of years, I will come back to church and start living more consciously for the Lord. Right now it is my time. I have to make my mark, do my thing. I am sure God understands."

Many younger people share this young man's view. It's even common among older people when they are considering young adults, "Let them have their fun; they will come back to the Lord when they are older," some might say. However, that is not the view of Scripture, as we see in today's passage.

As the preacher who wrote the book of Ecclesiastes approaches the end of his work, he states, "Remember also your Creator in the days of your youth, before the evil days come," (12:1). This instruction refers to far more than simple mental recollection. It is a call to live according to His standards. It involves action; those who remember God worship Him and seek guidance from Him in His Word (see Ps 22: 27; Jonah 2:7). Why the call to remember our Creator in our youth? Part of it has to do with the complacency of youth, the assumption while we are young that we have many years ahead of us, and so we can put off for tomorrow what we might otherwise do today. The call is also given so that young people make the best use of the strengths of youth before old age saps our energy and gives us more burdens to carry. Matthew Henry comments, "Call Him to mind while thou art young, and keep Him in mind throughout all the days of thy youth, and never forget Him. Guard thus against the temptations of youth, and thus improve the advantages of it." Ecclesiastes 12: 2 - 8 paints the slow decline of old age in order to underscore the need to use the strength of youth wisely for God---while this strength remains.

But the most important reason to remember God while we are young lies in the fact that life is fleeting. Life is vanity (v. 8), that is, quick to come and go. Youth --- and even old age--will not last forever. But all that we do in memory of our Creator, no matter how old we are when we do it, will be remembered by the Lord forever (vv. 13-14; see I Cor. 3: 10 -15).

LIVING BEFORE THE FACE OF GOD:

Whether we are young or old, our lives on this side of the grave will not go on forever. A day is coming when we will stand before our Creator, and He will reveal how we have remembered Him. If we have remembered His character and what He has done, repenting of our sin and trusting in Him alone, we will inherit eternal life! But if we die without having remembered the Lord, we will suffer the eternal pain and death of hell.
