I can tell that the last few weeks have been busy ones — not by looking at my calendar, although that's also a pretty good clue — but by the fact that it's been weeks since I read a murder mystery! Lately, I've been limiting myself to collections of short stories, precisely because they are short. I can finish one in 10-15 minutes, and then go on to something else that I need to be doing. But a mystery — well, that's going to take at least a two-hour chunk of time, because once I start one I can't stand to put it down until I finish it.

I've often wondered what it is about mysteries that I find so appealing. It's more than just escapism; there's lots of other stuff I read as well that's just "brain candy," but nothing that I enjoy quite so much, or have read quite so many of, as a good murder mystery. (I've also read a fair number of bad ones, but that's a different matter altogether!)

One thing that's sort of comforting about mysteries: By the end of the book, everything is neatly wrapped up and solved. My life never works like that! It seems like I don't ever get to finish one project before starting in on another. Some things never seem to be finished at all; they just keep growing and changing. It's awfully nice to escape for a while to a world where details get neatly wrapped up and questions are answered. It's kind of like the 30-minute TV sitcom format: There is nothing that can happen to any of the characters that can't be solved or concluded within 30 minutes or 300 pages, give or take a few.

But my suspicion is that the main thing which keeps pulling me back to the mystery section of the (used-)bookstore is that, in the fictional world, right and wrong are so easy to identify. The lines are clearly drawn between good and evil. Someone was killed; we must find the perpetrator. The solution and the plot may be complex, but there is very little moral ambiguity.

It's never that simple in real life. None of us is purely evil or purely good. Few of our actions can be categorized so easily (although, I'll make an exception for taking part in neo-Nazi activities...there is no ambiguity about that). Our motives are mixed. We are surrounded by problems which admit of no easy solutions. Sometimes the innocent are harmed, and the guilty go free. Sometimes there is no right answer. Sometimes, even if you know the right answer, there's nothing you can do about it. Sometimes, your "right answer" and my "right answer" contradict one another.

I can only wish that my life were as simple as the world of the murder mystery! But God's ways are not my ways (which is a very good thing for the rest of humankind), and I have to trust that God is in control, even when I can't see it; and that God will make things clear to me when the time comes that I need to do something about them. And until then . . . see you in the mystery aisle!

A House on the Rock

"Whoever hears these sayings of Mine, and does them, I will liken him to a wise man who built his house on the rock: and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house; and it did not fall, for it was founded on the rock.

But everyone who hears these sayings of Mine, and does not do them, will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand: and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, and it fell. And great was its fall." Matt. 7: 24 - 27

Not far from where I used to live in Oregon is an island that hides a secret---of a town that fell into the sea.

The island is all that remains of a peninsula that looked like prime real estate in the early part of the twentieth century. Developers laid out the streets for a town and named it Bayocean. Families built homes. A three-story hotel went up on the top of a bluff 140 feet above the ocean. Picnickers from Portland crowded the beaches.

But the town was built on sand, and winter storms started taking their toll. One house at a time, Bayocean tumbled into the waves. By 1952, the town---including the hotel, the bluff, and most of the peninsula---had washed away.

Stories like this leave us with a hollow feeling, don't they? All those hopes vanishing without a trace. In today's text, Jesus teaches about the importance of building our life on what will last---through this life and for eternity.

But how do you build a "house" that will survive? Jesus put it in very direct terms. The person whose house rests on a rock is "whoever" hears these sayings of Mine and does them" (v. 24).

Jesus pointed out the importance of doing, not just knowing, the truth in a similar story in Luke's Gospel.. In this instance, Jesus used the image of building on a foundation:

"But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord' and not do the things which I say....? But he who heard and did nothing is like a man who built a house on the earth without a foundation, against which the stream beat vehemently; and immediately it fell. And the ruin of the house was great."

Obedience---doing the truth---may be the most important rule for building a storm-proof life. "The evidence of knowing God is obeying God." writes one commentator. How easy it is for us to listen to Jesus'words, fit them into our beliefs, nod our heads in agreement ...and take no action. Yet this response---so recognizable and common---is as dangerous as staking our future on a hill of sand. James wrote, "But be ye doers of the Word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves," (James !: 22). , .

Amazing, isn't it? God's blueprint for a life that endures is simple for anyone to understand: Listen to the truth and do it!

"No other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ." I Corinthians 3: 11.
