

PASTOR'S PEN: REV. DR. JULIE ADKINS

The day has finally come! We have a pastor!

Let us introduce you to the Rev. Dr. Jerry Carpenter. Dr. Carpenter has a BS in Education and Master of Ed. in Counseling from Lamar University (Beaumont) and Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry from SMU. He taught in the Texas public school system for several years before answering the call to the ministry. He began his ministry in the United Methodist Church and later transferred his ordination to the United Church of Christ (UCC). He comes to us from Weimer, Texas. He is retiring from the UCC and had already planned a move to Tyler when he discovered our search for a pastor. He connected with the PNC just about the time our congregation decided to close the position of full-time pastor. Through our conversations with him, we learned of his desire to continue to serve God in ministry and his willingness to serve in a part-time position. He is an energetic preacher and expresses a desire to serve our church community in all areas and especially in congregational care.

Physically active, Carpenter is a runner-turned-walker and an amateur chef. He and his wife, Doris, have been married for over 43 years. She is a retired Texas public school teacher. They are not new to the East Texas area, having served in both Edom and Tyler with the Methodist Church. They have a son and daughter, both of whom are married.

So, how can we hire a non-Presbyterian minister? The Presbyterian Church is in full communion with several denominations. Simply put, this means we may call pastors from these denominations to serve in a PCUSA church. (For more information, see http://oga.pcusa.org/section/ecclesial-and-ecumenical-ministries/ecumenical-and-agency-relationships/ministers-other-denominations/) The United Church of Christ is one of those full communion partners. The UCC is not related to the Church of Christ that most of us are familiar with here in East Texas. The UCC worship service is VERY similar to that of the Presbyterian Church. Especially notable to me, was the fact that our communion service liturgy is the same. When the PNC interviewed Dr. Carpenter, we asked about his understanding of Presbyterian Church polity. He immediately answered with great knowledge (more than I knew!) and willingness to learn more.

Dr. Carpenter will be coming on board most likely the first Sunday in May. Stay tuned for more information.

Praise God that He has brought us to this partnership with the Rev. Dr. Jerry Carpenter!

TOTAL CONTROL:

"Now listen, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money." Why you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, "If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that." As it is, you boast and brag. All such boasting is evil. Anyone, then, who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it, sins. James 4: 13 – 17

Planning is something we do every day, a necessary effort to make the most of our time here on earth. Without an intelligent plan, disorder and chaos overwhelm us.

Yet James insists that planning can be "evil" (his word, not mine) if we plan without making room for God. Why? Because it's presumptuous to assume that we have that much control over our lives! How can we presume to mark our calendars one year hence when we don't know what the next moment will bring? How can we plan so confidently for tomorrow when we may not be here when it comes?

Paul puts it this way: "We know that in all things {and he means all things] God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to his purpose. For those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the likeness of his Son ..." (Romans 8: 28-29).

Paul is not suggesting that all things are good, or ought to feel good, but that things are working for our good, the good for which we were created---to be like God's own dear Son.

I find contentment in that assurance. God's will is my safety---to know that I'm not my own, to know that no matter what I plan I am always in God's plans. I can cast all my anxiety on Him because He is caring for me. To quote angler, Izaac Walton:

"When I would beget content and increase confidence in the providence of Almighty God, I will walk in the meadows by some gliding stream, and there contemplate the lilies and other little dumb creatures for which God plans and cares and therefore trust in Him."

The word, "trust" they tell me is an old contraction of the superlative degree of "true" (true, truer, truest). Trust knows that God is incomparably true when He tells us that all things---even those that seem wrong or regressive---are determined for our ultimate eternal good.

Are there deep disappointments in your life? The question is this: How do you regard these happenings? Are you frustrated because your plans have gone awry? Have bitterness and cynicism drawn you into thinking some blind fury is against you?

There is a better way- - - - -the way God's humble saints have always gone,. It is to acknowledge God in all your ways, to know that Wisdom is at work though it may not seem to be working at all, quietly, invisibly, inexorably working all things for good. In this you can rest.

Thy will, not mine, O Lord, However dark it be! Lead me by thine own hand, Choose out the path for me.

Smooth let it be or rough, It will be the best; Winding or straight, it leads Right onward to thy rest.

I dare not choose my lot; I would not, if I might; Choose Thou for me, my God; So shall I walk aright.

Take thou my cup, and it With joy or sorrow fill, As best to Thee may seem; Choose Thou my good and ill.

Choose Thou for me my friends, My sickness or my health; Choose Thou my cares for me, My poverty or wealth.
