

PASTOR'S PEN: REV. DR. JERRY CARPENTER

Preacher, Minister, Reverend, Pastor...all are words that are often used to describe or name the person a congregation calls to lead them spiritually. People who fulfill such roles are often called one or all of these names. When I began my ministry 27 years ago, I thought about which of these words I would choose if I were to select one of them that would define what I do in ministry more distinctly than the others. The word I use most often to define my role in ministry is "pastor".

Yes, I am involved in ministry in many ways as the leader of a congregation and preaching and teaching are part of the call and duties of a minister. The word "pastor", however, defines my call in a way that is much more aligned with what I see a minister doing in the role he fulfills with a congregation and is comprehensive of the other titles one may choose to name the leader. Pastor is a name that is closely related to the word "shepherd" as both words share a common root meaning.

Being a pastor puts one in the role where he cares for those who are in his "flock", those who need ministry in many ways. A pastor visits those who are ill and who may be in the hospital or care facilities. A pastor counsels with persons who are in need of spiritual or personal direction. A pastor teaches those who have a desire to grow spiritually both at the church and in other venues that may happen within the ministry context. A pastor considers those in his care as persons of worth and persons loved by God.

We recently had "Shepherd Sunday" on the Fourth Sunday after Easter. On that Sunday, we read from John's Gospel the selection that begins, "I am the Good Shepherd..." Those are Jesus' words to describe him and how he relates to all who are in his care. He makes the differentiation between the shepherd who owns the sheep and cares for them and the hired hand who only works for the shepherd to oversee them. The shepherd loves them and calls them by name and they hear the voice of the shepherd and come at his call. The hired hand runs away when danger happens and allows the wolf to scatter and snatch the sheep. Jesus says that since he is the Good Shepherd then he will care for the sheep and look out for their well-being.

Pastors minister on behalf of the Good Shepherd to care for the sheep so that the will of God is done to keep them safe and near to God. Pastors are not perfect people because they are human, after all, but they are charged with acting on behalf of the Good Shepherd to do what they feel Jesus would do if He was in human flesh for the well-being of all the sheep. Pastors cannot do everything that needs to be done so he encourages all in his care to help care for one another.

I hope to be in ministry to you all as I get to know you and find areas of service with which I can connect with you. I want to connect with you as your pastor and your friend and do all I can to help the body of Christ to be active and vital and involved in ministry wherever it is needed. As we work together, we can accomplish much for the Kingdom of God.

From the Desk of Ruth Shelton

Life is Temptation James I: 12-18

It pursues us through childhood, adolescence, adulthood, old age, and senility (!) right up to the gates of heaven. It entices us at work and play. It intrudes into our thoughts, our dreams, and even into our prayers. "Temptations to sin are sure to come," Jesus said.

God could spare us from such enticement, but He has determined not to do so—for good reason: "God permits temptation to sin," said Augustine, "to transform it into greater good."

Temptation makes us aware of "the strength of the evil impulse within us" and reveals the fragile stuff of which we are made. It humbles us. It makes us more reliant on God's strength, and therefore less likely to yield.

Though God allows temptation, He is not the source of it. James assures us. "When tempted, no one should say 'God is tempting me.' For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does He tempt anyone" (James I: 13). This is another way of saying that God's purposes are wholly good. It is not in God's nature to draw us into sin. No, we are the problem. We are tempted when we are "dragged away and enticed" by our own desires-our longings for something other than God, or something more than God has chosen to give us. In contrast, Satan wants to take life, God longs to give it.


How then, can we avoid being taken in by Satan's menace and deceit? By taking heed to God's WORD! The way to fend off Satan is to meet him at the beginning before he gathers strength and overwhelms you. Be vigilant, watchful, alert. Meet him immediately with a word from God and banish him, as you would dismiss some obnoxious traveling salesman, before he gets his foot in the door. Remind yourself of some word that God has given you that speaks to the particular *lie* Satan is advancing and submit yourself to that truth.

So, when Satan begins to croon one of his alluring, fatal tunes, sing to yourself the lyrics God's WORD, "sing and make music in your heart to the Lord" (Ephesians 5:19). And then submit yourself to that Word. This is Paul's "way of escape" (I Corinthians 10: 13). It's the only way to get through.
