# Jane's Journey



Some folks in our congregation may not have heard the story of how I ended up taking classes at Austin Seminary to get a Certificate in Ministry.

I was at a Presbytery meeting and they had a breakout session during lunch to explain their Commissioned Pastors program. This was before we had found Jerry Carpenter and I knew we were still searching for someone to preach here on a regular basis. That's one of the things I understood a Commissioned Pastor does-

they minister to small churches. I thought to myself, "I'll go to this meeting and find us one of those people for our church." It was kind of like a shopping trip. But when I got to the meeting I found out it was to explain to the attendees to how to **become** one of "those people." I felt like God had played a trick on me with the old bait and switch. And, sure enough, the very next day Julie Adkins preached her sermon on Matthew 25:14-30--the parable of the talents where God gets mad at the servant who wastes the talents he has been entrusted with by hiding them. She said it would have been better to have risked them and failed than to just keep them under a rock. I sat there in the pew among you all and thought to myself, "Uh Oh. Can this possibly have anything to do with that Commissioned Pastor program? I'm too old to start something new. What if I fail?" And of course, that was the whole point of the parable. Better to try and fail miserably than to not even try at all.

So, I signed up for the classes not knowing what would come next. And Armel Crocker signed up with me. And we are having a wonderful time.

The Certificate in Ministry requires six classes and one elective. We took the one required class that was offered: "Worship and Preaching" and the elective that interested us both was offered this semester so we took that one also, "Comparative Religions." We finished just this week with writing 10-page papers for each class. Each of us wrote on a different topic. Armel will have insights on Tithing and I will bend your ear on Art in Worship or how the different religions approach the poor. We also spent a weekend on campus at Austin Seminary and got some valuable hands-on experience preaching and learning about how to serve communion. We have also been to a meeting of all the Commissioned Pastors and CPs in training in Grace Presbytery and made to feel welcomed. The next classes start in October and I believe they will offer two more of the required classes. Armel and I would appreciate your prayers—that we are up to the academic load and that we are doing God's will and in a way that pleases God.

# "PENDY'S PEN" SANCTIFICATION: GROWING IN CHRIST

Sanctification: We normally associate this word to designate that which is "set apart in sacredness". The Apostle Paul makes excellent use of Romans 5 and 6 to introduce us to the basic fundamentals of sanctification. Romans 5 illustrates a sharp contrast between the first Adam, who ushered sin & death into the world, as opposed to Jesus, the second Adam, who by God's grace, offers the assurance of eternal life to all that belong to Him, & made possible by His finished work on the cross. Here, Paul grimly reminds us of the consequences of sin that has plagued mankind since the fall, & the desperate need for a Savior to save us & set us apart in sanctification. Romans 6 speak of those in Christ as being "slaves of



righteousness", the fruit of which leads to sanctification. Sanctification is mentioned twice in Romans 6, (verses 19 & 21).

Sanctification is derived from the Greek word "hagiosmos", meaning set apart in holiness or consecrated. Simply stated, it has to do with growing & maturing in Christ; laying aside the "old self" & putting on the" new" (Eph4:22-24) & being conformed in the image of Christ (Rom 8:29). R. C. Sproul, in his book "The Mystery of the Holy Spirit", describes sanctification as gradual & continuing throughout the life of the believer. While regeneration & sanctification are inter-related, they differ, in that being "born again" through regeneration is spiritual "birth", whereas sanctification is spiritual "growth". While the work of sanctification is primarily the work of the Holy Spirit (Rom15:16), it is also a Trinitarian work, involving both God & Christ, (1 Thes 5:23).

THE 3 LEVELS OF SANCTIFICATION: The Bible speaks of 3 levels, or stages of sanctification:

- Positional Sanctification: The initial sanctification that begins at the moment of salvation. (Rom6:11) demonstrates how one is "dead" in sin prior to being born again & "alive" to God in Christ Jesus after being regenerated. Here, all believers begin their spiritual journey as "babes" in Christ (1Pet2:1-3), seeking the "milk" of the Word as their source of growth.
- Progressive Sanctification: The process of becoming more Christ like in nature (Col 3:10), a daily zeal for growing in knowledge of the Word (1 Pet1:2), proclaiming the Gospel (Matt4:23), & witnessing to Christ (Acts 1:8). This spiritual growth continues throughout our life. It's now time to progress from the "milk" of the Word to a higher understanding of what Christ has accomplished in our lives. Complete or perfect sanctification, however, does not take place in this life, due to our struggle with the "flesh" (Rom12:1-2).
- Perfect Sanctification: The total, or perfect sanctification when a believer is glorified in Heaven,(1 Thes 5:23), (Rom 8:28-30), & (Phil 1:6).

CONCLUSION: HOW IS FAITH & SANCTIFICATION RELATED? Ephesians 2:8-10 affirms that our salvation is a Divine gift of God's grace alone, through faith, & not through works of our own. What, then, is the purpose of the works described in Ephesians 2:10? These are works of sanctification ordained by God himself, that we, as Christians, are chosen & called to walk in. They involve human effort & testify to our faith; a working faith that matures us spiritually.

But even more importantly, through sanctification, we are the "vessels or means", that God uses to accomplish His sovereign will. It is His Divine power that enables us to glorify Him in the highest, as we live out the 2 greatest commandments of love, in our outreach, our witnessing, & through the "great commission". Philippians 2:12-13 is a prime example: "As we work out our salvation with fear & trembling", it is God that is at work in us to will & to work for His good pleasure. We are the" means" & He is the" source & the power". All praise & glory is His!
