Remember when you were a child and were playing a game with your friends and you made a mistake. Maybe you were like some kids and asked your friends for a "do-over". That was the term that meant that you wanted them to ignore what you had previously done and to allow you the chance to do it again, all over without the record of your original action being remembered.

We all want "do-overs" in life, chances to start again and to make things right when we make mistakes. We have many opportunities for "do-overs" as we make our journey through life. Hanging up a coat before you're asked to
You'll find many ways to understand what love is....
Just by being there when things are sad and scary
Just by being there, being there, being there to say,
I love you

If I have learned anything in my journey through life I have learned to never be embarrassed to tell someone that I love them and that there are an unlimited number of ways to say it. I am still learning new ways to say it

Sometimes it's hard to recognize. But if you look you can find signs everywhere. Our Creator tell us in subtle ways-- in a leaf changing colors on a tree or in a glistening raindrop. Look! God is talking to us: "I love you." That's kind of what the cross is saying when we see it.

At their December 9th meeting, the Session approved the church's 2019 Operating Budget noting this year's approved budget shows an approximate increase of 14% in both income (pledge and estimated non-pledge) and expenses from the 2018 budget.

Dates have been set for important Congregational Meetings in January:

- January 6th: Election of Elders to replace Ronnie Knight and Becky Poe (expired terms), Armel Crocker (resignation) and a fourth elder position which has been unfilled since September 2018.
- January 27th: Session Committee chairpersons will present their annual "state of the church" reports.

The January Session meeting date has been rescheduled for Sunday, January 20th. Visitors are always welcomed, but must be placed on the agenda ahead of time if they wish to address any concerns.

2019- A Year of Spiritual Renewal

2019 has been designated as a Year of Spiritual Renewal at First Presbyterian Church of Winnsboro. This year will offer us all the opportunity to grow spiritually as we begin new efforts to read more of the Bible, to pray more often and in many new and creative ways, and to explore new patterns of worship and prayer that may open new pathways to the Holy Spirit's presence becoming more recognizable in our lives.

Each month we will be given the scriptures that will be read during worship each Sunday. You are encouraged and challenged to read these readings in advance each week before you attend worship service and to formulate questions about the readings that may help you to have new ears to listen to what is read and proclaimed in worship weekly. The lectionary readings will be listed in the newsletter each month and you are encouraged to either print them out or to refer to the listing on the church website in order to read the four readings before you attend worship. If you are not able to attend worship one Sunday, this will also serve as a wonderful way of bringing God's Word into your life to nourish your spirit daily. Read the readings at least once each week but you may also wish to make them part of your daily devotional practice.

That also brings us to another emphasis in our effort to have spiritual renewal in our lives. If you do not have a daily devotional practice as part of your daily routine, this new year offers you the chance to incorporate one into your life. Your devotional practice will be unique and individualized for you by what you choose to do. Some may simply read the Bible and pray silently in a comfortable place in their home. Other may read what is called "The Daily Office" which are scriptures based on the lectionary and assigned for daily use. This can be found in many ecumenical sources and I will provide sources for those who would like to begin such a spiritual practice. Regardless of what you choose as your daily devotional practice, having one increasing your awareness of the presence of God in your life.

We will also be exploring new ideas and practices in worship this year. Silence, meditation, guided prayer, and other practices have been a part of Christian worship since the Church began in the first century. We all need to use our senses to experience worship even as we use them to navigate the world around us on a daily basis. Gradually, we will incorporate some new spiritual practices in worship as we explore how God may speak to each of us in new ways as we open ourselves to God's Spirit at work among us.

The Spirit is at work in our lives daily. May God be with us and bless us in our efforts to listen and learn and grow in God's grace throughout this new year.
