Summer is officially here! The weather staff on our local television stations often now says that we have "meteorological summer" which begins June 1 and lasts until Sept 1, despite the fact that the calendar says that summer begins on June 20, the date of the summer solstice, the longest day of the year. I don't know about you, but I have always thought that summer begin with Memorial Day and ended with Labor Day. I guess that is because our lives have been shaped by the school calendars so much that we have lived with that thinking that when school is out, then summer happens.

My wife is a retired school teacher and for part of her experience, she worked in the Van ISD, not too far from here. The school superintendent during part of her career was an energetic younger man who convinced the school board to try what they called "a modified year round plan" for a few years. The plan had school begin around August 1 and end sometimes in June. At first there was some resistance to the idea but once it was in place most people there loved the school calendar. It gave students and teachers more time off during the school year even though they were meeting for the same number of instructional days. Suddenly they had Fall Break in addition to Thanksgiving Break, they had Christmas Break and Winter Break, and they had Spring Break and Easter Break. The staff working at the school felt more refreshed because of the plan and the students enjoyed all the breaks spread out through the school year. It was the same number of days that the school was open for learning but just arranged differently.

Then, the State of Texas, in their ultimate wisdom, decided that the state needed a uniform school calendar where all the schools in the state started on the same date and ended about the same time. So, individual differences for public schools were eliminated and the year round school calendar stopped working for Van ISD. I hear there are some schools in Texas that still try a year round plan and are granted a waiver by the State to operate as such but those are few and far between.

So, school is out and children are around for the summer until the last Monday in August. Parents are trying to figure out how to fill up the days and weeks so the children are occupied. Time is a fleeting commodity and must be used wisely or it is soon gone and can never be recovered.

The Psalmist spoke in a prayer, "Teach us, O Lord, to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. O satisfy us, early with thy mercy that we may rejoice and be glad all our days." In other words, God help us to use our time wisely. Help us not to waste time with things that really do not matter but help us to stay focused on what is good and right and true and instructive for living.

Summer is a time for family fun, for outdoor activities, for travel, for vacations, for reunions. It is a time to stay active in your church also. The church only exists for its members and those who seek spiritual renewal. If no one is there, then the church need not open its doors. There is an old saying, "Showing up is half the battle." That is true for all of life. Just getting there is often hard, but if we put forth the effort and make being in church a priority in our lives, then it will be something that really does matter to us.

Join us this summer for worship and learning and fellowship and fun. Invite someone else to come with us too. We are all important in the life of the church. If you are not there, you are missed.

Jane's Journey



Armel Crocker and I are taking Theology right now. I don't know what he thinks but for me, it's one of the hardest classes I taken so far and also one of the most rewarding.

Last week one of our discussion topics was to tell about our favorite cross. Everybody in the class, of course, waxed eloquently about their favorite. But yesterday something made me think of the cross in a new way.

An old Presbyterian friend from out of town was visiting and I went into Dallas to see her and visit. She had been to church with her sister. It was one of those new non-denominational churches: big, loud contemporary music, with a "stage" and an "auditorium" (yes, they called it that). She told me there wasn't a cross anywhere in sight.

I had heard about this phenomenon in the new mega churches. I'm not really sure what their thinking is. I have heard they think the cross "makes people nervous."

Armel and I have learned there are a few 'musts' in worship: a font, table, chalice and, yes, a cross. I can promise you a cross in a Presbyterian church.

But we are also learning in our Theology class that the cross should make us anything but nervous.

It's a symbol of God's amazing love for us. Our class spent last week learning over three different theories of Atonement and I can't promise that I understand them yet. My head is filled with names like Anselm, Abelard and *Cristus Victor*. I think I could spend the rest of my life digesting these theories but I do understand that there's not just one answer. I think of all the things I've learned so far in Seminary the main thing I've learned is that sometimes we just can't fully grasp God. In fact, one of the best quotes so far I found on Facebook is from Rachel Held Evans who said, "Once you understand God, God ceases to be God." I think the God I believe in is great and magnificent beyond understanding. But loving and reassuring.

The one thing I do know—the answer I know in my bones, that I can take to the bank: is that God loves me. And you. And what a wonderful thing it is to see the cross in our Sanctuary and remember that.

Reid Committee Votes to Support Northeast Texas International Water Ministries



At their recent Reid Foundation meeting, the committee (Becky Poe, Armel Crocker, John Clark, Carolyn Stewart, and Ronnie Knight) heard a very fascinating presentation by Harold and Kathy Patterson describing the work their organization does to coordinate with missionaries and organizations in 3rdworld countries to supply clean water, teach sanitation & hygiene, and help in any other way to improve the lives of people in developing countries. They described their patented water well drill that was designed for the express purpose of drilling shallow water wells. To date they have drilled wells in more a dozen counties in Africa and South America.

With the help of donations, both large and small, they build a drilling rig and ship it. Once the drill is on site, a team flies to the location where they train 3 to 5 Christian young men how to operate and maintain

the drill and mud pump. When the trained team is in place, Harold and his crew return home and leave the drilling equipment in the hands of the trained Christian men so they can continue to drill for their community.

Just outside of Winnsboro is their training facility and shop for building the drills. Visitors can contact the Patterson's and make arrangements to visit the facility.

The Reid Committee voted to make a \$1,000 donation this year and also to contact Grace Presbytery to see if there is foreign mission money available for additional funding. It takes about \$10,000 to build the equipment and send a team out for the installation and training. Individuals can make personal donations by visiting their website (<u>www.ntiwm.org</u>). Small donations are pooled and used for the travel expenses incurred for getting Mr. Patterson and his crew to their installation locations.

Financial news - The Session accepted a letter from Jerry Poe resigning as Treasurer and expressed appreciation for Jerry's years of service as Treasurer. They have decided to hire Shannon Monk as bookkeeper to take care of our accounting needs and have appointed Elder Ronny Knight as Treasurer. Bank signature cards have been updated. The Session approved hiring Clara Ziegler to do the required annual audit.

From the Pastor - Rev. Jerry and Elder Carolyn Stewart took communion to our members at Autumn Wind and Trinity Mission Rehab. Pastor would like everyone to know that even though his official part-time hours are Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, he is available to anyone who needs him at ANY time. Just let him know if you need him.

Other actions taken - Elders Armel Crocker and Tricia Clark were commissioned to attend the June 1 Presbytery meeting. The 2018 Church Statistical Report was approved. The next Stated Meeting is July 14, 2019.

Blueberries

Mix sour cream, brown sugar and vanilla in a bowl.

In a separate bowl, whip cream until it starts to thicken. Add sugar, whip until thick.

Fold cream into sour cream mixture and blend well.

Serve over fruit.
