Jane's Journey

I'm about to take the journey of a lifetime. And, assuming I can test negative for Covid and they let me on the plane, my dream is about to come true. I will leave May 20 for a couple of weeks in England and Scotland. I'll be going with a group from Grace Presbytery to study Celtic Spirituality.

For several years I have been wanting to visit the Island of Iona off the Northwestern coast of Scotland. I first heard of it when reading J. Philip Newell's book <u>Listening for the</u> <u>Heartbeat of God</u>. It tells the story of the Celts and the disciple John-- the disciple who supposedly was the one who reclined on the left side of Christ at the Last Supper

and thus was within the sound of his beating heart. Newell tells how in 664 a convocation was held to decide the future of the church in England. One choice was to go the way of the nature loving Celts who favored the writings of John and upheld the equality of women among other qualities. The other choice would be to go with the church in Rome who held more political power and who favored the disciple Peter ("Upon this rock I will build my church.") The decision went in favor of the Roman church and the Celtic church went underground, popping up periodically, nowadays mostly at Renaissance festivals.

We will be staying next door to the Abbey founded by St Columba in the sixth century. One of the earliest and most influential abbeys, it was instrumental in bringing Christianity to England. The island is small enough that we will be able to hike the perimeter in one day's hike. I'm especially looking forward to being able to walk on the beach and look out at the North Atlantic Ocean. I understand it is a wild and windy place.

There is something about the wind that calls to my mind the Holy Spirit. Iona is known as a Thin Place. That means a place where "the veil between humanity and the spiritual realm is especially **thin**" a place where you can almost reach out and touch God. Folks I would like to do that. I would like to be able to touch God. I would like to feel God's touch on my face. I am going with an earnest desire to hear God speak to me.

I know I can do this here at home. There may not be as much wind in Winnsboro as on the coast of the northern Atlantic Ocean. But I can hear the wind through the pines rubbing countless pine needles against each other. Sometimes I stand in awe and realize that the sound two simple pine needles rubbing against each other would be imperceptible to my ears. So how many does it take to make the roar that I am hearing? Standing outside and thinking things like this brings me to a position of humility before God and I realize I don't go outside nearly enough. Everywhere we walk outside becomes a cathedral.

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
