Jane's Journey

I know that everybody is supposed to make New Year's resolutions but at my age I've made just about all the resolutions that I want to make and anything I would resolve at this point would be a repeat of past ones. I've come to realize that I might as well give up on the weight thing. There's just no point in it. It is what it is, for better or for worse, and I've made my peace with the current state of not just the weight thing but the whole package. I'll never look like a movie star, nor would I want to put in the time, expense or effort to achieve the change in my appearance. I'm content to look like this. I've even given up on my singing voice. In

the past several months I've faced not one but two congregations without a pianist and I have had to lead the doxology and hymns **a cappella**. <u>Lead</u> them. By myself. That has got to be the most egobusting exercise a pastor can survive. And I emerged with a gold star engraved with the words of the Psalmist saying, "Make a joyful noise."

We have been given absurdly human selves. One of the most successful New Years Resolutions I ever made was the year I resolved to laugh more. I forget what year it was but I decided that I had become too serious, so my resolution that year was to laugh more and I set upon the year to enjoy life and not take it so seriously. So that year I deliberately laughed more. I just plain old laughed. And it worked.

It turned out the world did not need me as much as I thought and I relaxed and enjoyed myself. I noticed that my increased laughter was contagious. Others around me laughed more, also. It turns out what they say is true: laughter is infectious.

I was checking Facebook on Christmas Eve and found one of my favorite Christian Theologians. You don't have to be dead to be a good theologian. And here is what the great KC Clark-Porter says. In addition to the point that, in Jesus, God took on a mortal human body, something we could spend a lot more time exploring in all of it's surprising theophanies, KC reminds us to relax and enjoy life.

"What I celebrateis that God, who didn't need a body, got one. That there is holiness in flesh; and enfleshed holiness appears to us whether we're religious or not: in the miracle of human touch, the delight of food and drink, the wonderment of beauty, the holiness of laughter, the ecstasy of love.

So celebrate YOUR BODY. Sing. Give hugs and kisses. Smell delicious smells. Listen to beautiful music. Make love. Call your friend and soften at the sound of their voice. And don't forget to laugh in the face of the -isms and -archies of this world. It's almost as good as kissing your favorite dog."

Find your dog and give it a kiss. Usher in 2023 with a good laugh and keep laughing. If the past few years didn't teach us anything, it was that we might as well laugh. Worrying hasn't done us a bit of good. It's time for laughter.
