Jane's Journey

I went to one of the best meeting of Grace Presbytery I've ever had the pleasure of attending last Saturday. Let me tell you about it.

For one thing it was in person. And I usually know about half of the people at these meetings. They are all good friends and colleagues in ministry. I kept seeing the same gesture of outstretched hands with fingers wiggling in anticipation: people just wanted to get their hands on each other and hug. We were so happy to meet in person and not on a computer screen that it was palpable. It was good to see each other in the flesh.

It was a stated meeting which meant we had only one purpose and that was to vote on two nominations from committees. We would start with a short worship service as always and then listen to proposals from search committees for the two most consequential positions in the presbytery: General Presbyter and Stated Clerk. The General Presbyter position had been vacant for three and a half years, a long time – mostly due to the pandemic but made easier by an easy-going and competent interim General Presbyter. But the other position had only been vacated in December by a retirement.

We knew going into the meeting we would make history by voting in a young black man as General Presbyter and an openly gay man as the Stated Clerk. They were introduced by the search committees with glowing recommendations as to their qualifications for the job. As in our national government, (which was based on the presbyterian form of government), the floor was opened to questions and comments. Only one person had a comment and that was really directed toward another issue completely. The moderator let him have his say (refer to my favorite paragraph in the Book of Order: Mutual Forbearance F3.0105). And we voted overwhelmingly to elect them.

I met Chris Lee, our new General Presbyter, about two years ago when Armel and I called him with questions about a program on race relations that we were interested in. He was one of the pastors at Canyon Creek in Richardson, one of the largest and fastest growing churches in the area. He is a bright, enthusiastic and humble guy and I think he will bring a new energy to our presbytery.

With these two guys, we join Austin Seminary who just installed an Hispanic president and a Black academic dean, in taking some pretty bold moves in the Diversity Department. And I know this might make some people uncomfortable. They might question their credentials and wonder if these people are really qualified or if we just put them there to look good.

For that question I can only say that I know any search committee in the Presbyterian Church is going to pray for the guidance of God's Holy Spirit every time they meet. They are going to pray in their car on the way to the meetings. They are going to pray at home at night, or while walking their dog, or drinking their morning coffee. They are going to pray their guts out that they are choosing the candidate of God's choice. I can only conclude the person they choose is therefore that choice. As a voting member of Grace Presbytery I could feel the Spirit moving in the Sanctuary on Saturday. I trust the movement of that Spirit. I trust our church to work through any difficulties a transition process brings. Chris Lee told us he would make mistakes and asked for our help when he did so. There was an atmosphere of love and support surrounding the election. We do not travel alone as we enter this new territory. We step out trusting in God and in each other. We are traveling toward the Kingdom of God.



Jack Sidney Baber

June 6, 1927-January 16, 2023

Jack was born in Brownsville, Texas on June 6, 1927, to Judge Lester Baber (Les) and Nana Louis Stokes Baber; while Les was working on a construction job. Shortly after Jack's birth the family moved back to Winnsboro. Jack graduated from Winnsboro High School in 1944. After graduation, Jack went to work in the oil fields of West Texas and Oklahoma. He served in the Army from 1945-46 and returned to

Winnsboro after he was Honorably Discharged. He worked on construction jobs and attended Kilgore Junior College for the next several years.

In May of 1950, Jack married Audrey Laverne Saxon (Laverne); the couple would be united in marriage for seventy years. Shortly after his marriage Jack bought the Sinclair oil dealership and began to sell petroleum products in the local area. During his time with Sinclair he learned about oil treating chemicals and began to sell them in the oil fields surrounding Winnsboro. In the early 1960s, Jack sold the Sinclair dealership and began his own business Jack Baber Oil & Chemicals; he continued this company until he retired in 1989.

Shortly after retirement, Jack and Laverne moved to Mineola and lived there for thirteen years. After that the couple moved to Tyler where they spent the last twenty years of their lives. Both Jack and Laverne referred to these as the happy years of their life due to the arrival of their grandsons Grant and Avery. Jack used to tease me and say, you know if I could have figured out how to have grandkids first; I think I would have had them and been done with it. After Laverne's death on September 2, 2020, Jack lived with his son and daughter-in-law, and grandchildren; except for a brief period near the end of his life when he required extra care.

Jack had a full and productive life, he enjoyed bird hunting, dogs and cats, working on any type of car or truck; and above all anything involving his grandsons. He was preceded in death by many friends and leaves many friends behind that will miss his warm and caring personality.

Jack was preceded in death by his parents; his wife Laverne; brothers Bill (Will T.) Baber; Bob (Robert H.) Baber, and Joe Baber; and sister Frances Alice Arrington. He is survived by his son Brian Saxon Baber, his wife Janice Inell Baber, grandsons Grant Baber and Avery Baber; nephews Ben Arrington and his wife Darlene; Jeff Baber and his wife Marlene; nieces Alice Arrington Newsome, Rivkah Cohen, and Sue Baber. They were married February 13, 1967; and have spent 56 wonderful years together in ministry, traveling the world on mission trips, writing books together, and counseling many families in the church. After moving to Winnsboro, her husband became the pastor of First Baptist Church, 1969-1979, while she served these years as pastor's wife, mother to two rambunctious, trouble-making little boys, and a public school teacher in Winnsboro and Como ISD. After much prayer she and Dan decided to travel as missionaries to South Africa, France, China, and various places in the US; they did Missions work in a total of 27 Nations of the World. She taught school in Pittsburg ISD, until they made the decision to home school the boys until their high school graduation.

Her greatest love was serving others and she did this for over 12 years when they purchased and renovated Thee Hubbell House Bed & Breakfast; 1987-1999. She then took her love of teaching back to the classroom, however this time it was at the Johnston Unit of Texas Department of Criminal Justice as a GED teacher from 1995-2010. There she had the privilege to graduate over 1500 men with their GED. She was honored as "Teacher of the Year" while employed at the prison. She retired from teaching in 2010; but continued to do ministry work in the local Winnsboro and surrounding areas with her husband and her very close ladies bible group. She valued the relationships with her family member who are pastors and love the Lord as much as she did. Her brother-in-law Pastor Mickey Hubbell, nephews Pastor John D. Cooke, Pastor Shiles Hubbell, grandson Pastor Lance Bass, and her most loved Pastor her husband Dan Hubbell.

She also has a dear and loving sister-in-law Ann Neighbors of Austin, Tx that was married to her late brother Bob; and many, nieces, nephews, cousins, students she taught, dear friends all over that she loved and admired.

She has accomplished so many milestones in her life, but her most joyous, treasured one happened over 31 years ago when she became "LOVEY". Since then, she has only grown that title grand by grand, followed by great-grand, and most recently great-great-grand. Her Grands were her world and she never missed a birthday that she and Poppa-D would not call and sing "Happy Birthday" to each and every one of them or she never missed an opportunity to "play the piano"; which was not the typical way.
