Jane's Journey

I am an expert at apologies. I think that's because I have so much experience messing up and needing to ask different people to forgive me.

I took a required two-day class on boundaries through the Presbytery over the last two days. It was online through a video conference call. I realized about an hour into the class that as we had been making our introductions and getting to know each other, I might have offended one of the men I had just met. A little while later, I mentioned the incident and it turned out that I had made him feel awkward through the

comment I made. The nature of the class gave the two of us an opportunity to set the record straight and it became a learning experience for everyone. We cleared the air and I was able to make a heart-felt and honest apology. He was able to see my sincerity and accept my apology.

Our exercise had all the elements of what I have come to realize are the hallmarks of the best kind of apologies. A good apology should:

1. be made as soon after the offense as possible. 2. It should be made directly to the person offended by the person committing the offense 3. It should be simple, sincere and direct. 4. A good apology includes Repentance. Try not to repeat the offense again. Learn from your mistakes, if possible.

In my vast experience of mistake-making, I like to think I have learned through the years.

Jews have a whole Day of Atonement called Yom Kippur for a 25-hour period and this year it was on September 24. During this time they focus on asking for forgiveness from each other and from God.

Christians do this on a weekly basis as part of our worship.

I used to think I was the only one who messed up until I started noticing how quiet it got in the sanctuary during the prayer of Confession of Sins.

One of my favorite authors is Anne Lamotte and she is famous for saying that there is really only two prayers: "Help me! Help Me! Help me!" and "Thank You! Thank You! Thank!" Prayer isn't really any more complicated than that. "I'm sorry." Is probably a variation of those.
