- Adopted the 2025 budget

# Jane's Journey

Have you ever been face to face with a newborn baby and had the urge to ask them what God is like? They have just come from heaven and if they could only talk, you could ask them what God is like. I asked my granddaughter this once and was astonished to hear Sarah answer that she could remember being a baby and talking to God. God told her that she would be safe because God was right there with her.

The idea that we come from God and return to God is one of my favorite ideas. A seed is planted then fertilized by nutrients of past

vegetation. The seed grows, blooms and blossoms into glorious flower then becomes fruit. We all eventually die and return our nutrients to the soil and the life cycle continues.

It's the things we do with our lives in between the beginning and the end that give it its meaning.

But our relationship with God is what actually tells us what to "do" with our lives and how that meaning matters.

The longer I live I am learning that people who live quiet lives can have great impact on others. I'm gaining a great appreciation for quiet people.

While in the past it was a popular Lenten practice to "give up" something we are now encouraged to think about "taking on" a practice. And the practice doesn't have to be anything wild or energetic it can be a quiet and introspective like extra prayers, devotions or meditations. Simply setting aside extra time to listen for God to speak to you in a quiet place can be a very spiritual time. Most cell phones can set an alarm to remind you to pray whenever you ask it to. I suspect that God actually prefers these quiet moments to flashy ones.

Let us use the Lenten season to prepare ourselves to understand more fully our relationship with God and the love Christ has for humanity. A love so great that he was willing to give his life for us in the ultimate sacrifice for our sins. In my mind I always picture a great gap between our Creator and humanity with Christ reaching his arms out to fill that gap with one hand grasping God and one hand grasping onto human, Christ: fully human, fully God.

May you have a meaningful Lent this year.
