Jane's Journey

June is when the wheat ripens. I pass several wheat fields on my way to Paris every other Sunday morning as I did a couple of days ago. Yesterday the field was ready to harvest so I pulled over to take a few stalks to use for decoration in the chancel. They never last long, only a couple of weeks, before the fragile binding gives way and everything falls apart. Wheat is not meant to be a permanent decoration; it's intended to be harvested and consumed. God designed it that way.

As I stood to give thanks for the harvest I was struck by the sight of the blue sky above and the bright yellow field below: the exact picture of the flag of Ukraine, the country who has always been the world's largest wheat producer. So, in addition to thanking God for my tiny harvest of a handful of wheat stalks the farmer won't miss, I prayed for the people of Ukraine. Then I prayed for the people caught up in the war in the Middle East and the innocent children in the Gaza strip. I could have stood there all morning until I realized I had a schedule to attend to. I needed to get back on the road to preach in Paris.

I've long been fascinated by the idea of taking the sacrament to its most elemental level of one grape and three grains of wheat. After all, the meal was only a symbol of Christ's body, of his sacrifice, a method of remembering him. But, wow, what a powerful way to remember him! I've always thought it clever of him to pick something we do three times a day as a method of remembering him. In Paul's letter to the Corinthians he claims that Jesus said, "Do this as often as you eat it in remembrance of me." (I Corinthians 11:25) I understand this to mean that we should remember Christ every time we eat. With every slice of bread, every hamburger bun, taco shell, croissant, or chip.

Over the next month we might pass wheat fields and we can remember the wheat Jesus used to help us remember his great love for us. Such great love that he was willing to die for us. If you happen to glimpse a golden crop standing under a blue sky, think of an innocent population who provide the world's most staple crop in the midst of war. Or maybe you could use the quiet ride in the country to just remember the innocent earth God gave us to be stewards over and pray that we are up to the job. Amen.
