Jane's Journey

On my faith journey of well-over 70 years I have encountered many great resources.

Most of my best resources were the people God placed in my path along the road.

But some were published. The first written one was the classic Westminster Catechism. My father, being a wise man and

knowing I was a curious child, simply left a copy of the shorter version on the coffee table in the den and waited, much like the fisher does with tasty bait and a prize fish. I didn't pour over the whole thing or aspire to become a pastor on the spot but I did read the first line and it stuck with me: "What is the chief end of man? To glorify God and enjoy God forever."

We have come a long way since that time and I have now been privileged to not only see the latest version of how we educate ourselves on what Presbyterians believe but with the most current technology. I was on a Zoom call last week with the monthly Small Church Gathering hosted by Grace Presbytery. And their guest that night was Miatta Wilson, the PCUSA Director of Christian Formation who spent almost an hour showing us educational resources that are available online. One such resource is probably the <u>easiest to understand</u> while being <u>theologically correct</u> and CONCISE (!).....while giving <u>scripture</u> to back it all up.

I can happily endorse this resource and with pride because I know both Miatta and the guy who wrote the document, John Williams, the Chaplain at Austin College. Some of you may also know John. I believe he may have preached here before.

The link is below. If you have any trouble, I have printed out a couple of copies of the document that I can loan you. Or you can go to the PCUSA website and look for resources and then search for this by name, "Why Presbyterians Are Like That" There are two versions: one directed for college age and one for adults. The document is 133 pages. I suggest printing on two sides of the paper.
